Executive Summary

Program Year 3 CAPER Executive Summary response:

Beaver County is a unique area made up of 54 municipalities. It represents a mix of rural and urban environments that reflect diverse cultural and socioeconomic backgrounds. The County is both large enough and small enough to utilize its investments of private and public funds to make a significant impact on the health of our various communities. In an effort to keep both the rural and urban areas viable, the County is committed to supporting projects that promote residential, economic and commercial growth. Using CDBG funds as a match to DCED funds, the County implemented the first phase of a countywide comprehensive plan to create a vision and a plan for strengthening its economic, cultural, education, housing and natural resources.

Using HOME funds, construction was completed of an 11-unit townhouse project in the Borough of East Rochester. The total project cost was \$900,000, more than one-half of which was supported through private investment. Another example of a healthy affordable housing partnership is the completion of a 4-unit apartment structure in the Borough of West Mayfield, built by the Beaver County Community Development Housing Organization (BCCHDO). The total cost of the project was \$760,000, which included a \$390,000 investment of HOME dollars and a \$370,000 investment of other funds obtained by the BCCHDO.

The County contains 10 river-bordering towns, each striving to maintain thriving central business districts that serve as core community centers. These towns continue to enhance their central business districts through the use of CDBG funds involving a program that offers incentives to the commitment of private funds for the improvement of commercial facades. This year, all 10 rivertown communities benefited from a total expenditure of \$325,295, \$151,915 (47%) of which was funding entirely through private means.

The Home Improvement Program continues to be one of the most popular individual programs. This program is funded through CDBG and the County's Affordable Housing Trust Fund. During this year, \$478,586 was expended for improvements to owner-occupied residences. Of this investment, \$105,556 (23%) will be returned to the program as part of the loan commitment assumed by the participating home owners.

The County remains committed to these types of partnerships in its effort to utilize entitlement funds in the most effective, efficient and far-reaching manner.

While Beaver County continues to be generally satisfied with the progress made with regard to the priorities, goals and activities that were developed and included in the five-year plan, the objectives for the fair housing officer do not adequately reflect the requirements of the position. To help redefine those goals and objectives, a new analysis of impediments to fair housing choice was conducted in FY 2007 which will allow Beaver County to update its priorities in this area and give better direction to the fair housing officer. The new barriers to fair housing choice and action steps to address these Barriers will be reported in the FY 2008 CAPER.

b. Following is the listing of objectives and outcomes that have been developed from the five-year strategic plan and have been put into the new Performance Measurement format. Please see specific sheets under the Objectives tab in this document for associated proposed accomplishments and performance measures. In the narrative, the Community Development project numbers are listed after each objective and outcome. Projects completed in FY 2007 are then described in the narrative. Listings of all projects completed, ongoing and canceled during the reporting period are included as tabbed sections in the CAPER document. Only completed projects are reported on the Housing and Community Development Table.

Following are the projects that were ongoing at the end of FY 2007: To increase or improve the Availability and/or Accessibility of Decent Housing for Low Income Persons (DH-1) (HOME07, HOME05, Section 8 Housing Choice Vouchers, ESG05, Act 137, CD065511, CD064001, CD075519,) Under this objective and outcome, using no ADDI (HOME 2006) funds and \$87,731 in Act 137 Funds, 15 households were assisted through a first-time Homebuyer Assistance program. Nine households in public housing were assisted in becoming future homeowners through the Housing Authority of the County of Beaver's (HACB) Housing Choice Voucher Self-Sufficiency program. Fifteen units were constructed using \$44,193 in HOME funds. Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG) funding in the amount of \$152,388 assisted 276 homeless persons through the operation and rehabilitation of emergency shelters and 130 persons were assisted with transitional housing. In FY 2007, 26 units of public housing were constructed by the HACB to accommodate persons with mobility impairments. An additional 10 units of public housing were under construction to accommodate persons with mobility impairments. One CDBG project to install waterline laterals for the homes of low income people in North Sewickley Township was underway. In FY 2007, \$63,140 in CDBG Funds was spent on this objective. Two CDBG projects to provide telehealth monitors for low income residents to remain in their homes remained underway. One project that provides services to the elderly was ongoing (Matrix Code05A). One project providing sanitary sewer laterals to low income households was ongoing (Matrix Code 14A).

To increase the Affordability of Decent Housing for Low Income Persons (DH-2) (HOME-06, CD055519, CD065523, CD075516) In FY 2007, a total of \$15,221 in CDBG funding and \$47,383 in HOME funding was spent on this objective. In FY 2007, 42 additional low income households were assisted with tenant-based rental assistance through the HOME program (Matrix Code 05S). The HMIS assisted 320 low income persons in finding affordable housing and services (Matrix Code 05). The HACB assisted 649 households, 100 of which were new participants, through the public housing Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher program in Beaver County.

To Sustain Decent Affordable Housing for Low Income Persons (DH-3) (CD055500, CD065502, CD055501, CD065501, CD065500 CD065505, CD075500, CD075501, CD075502, CD075505, CD065512, HOME 06) In FY 2007, a total of \$802,933 in CDBG funding was spent on this objective. Under this objective (Matrix Code 14A), 44 homes of low income people were rehabilitated through the Home Improvement program, 35 homes of extremely low income people wwere weatherized through the Energy Conservation program, and 69 homes of low income people were rehabilitated through the Emergency Home Improvement program. The HACB rehabilitated 393 units of public housing occupied by low income persons. In FY 2007, 266 people were assisted with security deposits, utility assistance, rental assistance and/or mortgage assistance to prevent homelessness. Tenant-based rental assistance was provided to 42 people at risk of being homeless. With Supportive Housing funds, permanent housing and supportive services were provided for 63 unduplicated homeless persons with disabilities. Beaver County collaborated with 38 private and public agencies to identify and provide for the supportive service needs of public housing residents. The HACB continued to administer the SHARES, SHARES2 and Neighborhood Network programs which provided a variety of supportive services to 331 public housing residents. Twenty-six public housing residents served on the board of the HACB and three new resident councils were created. With Supportive Housing funding, 25 unduplicated homeless persons were provided permanent housing and supportive services. The Rodent Control program provided rodent abatement services for 202 low income people in Beaver County (Matrix Code 05).

To increase or improve the Availability and/or Accessibility of Suitable <u>Living Environments for Low Income Persons (SL-1) (CD045522, CD050300, </u> CD045520, CD045517, CD024707, CD033501, CD054701, CD063701, CD065505, CD065507, CD064801, CD060600, CD033401, CD052600, CD032201, CD042201, CD050700, CD060401, CD060503, CD063502, CD050301, CD070100, CD070104, CD073000, CD073702, CD075300, CD075510, CD075511, CD075512, CD075514) In FY 2007, \$572,713 in CDBG funds was spent on activities for this objective and outcome. \$28,794 was spent for 2 ongoing handicap accessibility projects and an electronic display system for a school district (Matrix Code 03). \$5,360 was spent on two projects to renovate a center for people with disabilities. (Matrix Code 03B). \$26,763 was spent on renovation to a senior center (Matrix Code 03A). \$31,500 of CDBG funds was spent to complete one project and continue progress on 4 projects to improve Neighborhood facilities (Matrix Code 03E), \$116,493 of CDBG funds was spent to complete one project and continue 9 park and recreation facilities improvement projects (Matrix Code 03F). \$2,348 in CDBG funds was spent for handicapped accessibility

improvements to a parking lot. In FY 2007, two sewer and waterline projects were begun (Matrix Code 03J). \$43,101 was spent on two roadway improvement projects (Matrix Code 03K). \$66,000 of CDBG funds was spent on a youth service program throughout Beaver County for an after school enrichment program that provided tutoring to 128 youth in grades 1-8 from low-income households (Matrix Code 05D). One project that provided a sign for a non-profit business serving youth and young adults was underway in 2007 (Matrix Code 14E).

<u>To increase the Affordability of Suitable Living Environments for Low Income Persons (SL-2).</u> there are no objectives or outcomes identified under this goal.

CD070102, CD070103, CD070200, CD070201, CD070500, CD070501, CD070502, CD070503, CD072200, CD072600, CD073300, CD073500, CD073501, CD073502, CD073700, CD073701, CD074800, CD075506, CD075517) In FY 2007, one general public facilities project was completed and 6 projects were underway using \$54,318 in CDBG fund (Matrix Code 03). Improvements to two centers that serve handicapped people were begun with expenditures of \$14,403 (Matrix Code Q3B). \$81,050 in CDBG funds was spent to complete two and begin five neighborhood facilities improvement projects (Matrix Code O3E). \$23,588 was spent on one complete and two ongoing park and recreation facilities improvement projects. One park and recreation facility improvement project was canceled (Matrix Code 03F). \$121,923 in CDBG funds was spent to complete one flood drainage improvement project (Matrix Code 031). \$23,588 was spent in CDBG funds to begin three water and sanitary sewer projects. One water and sewer project was canceled (Matrix Code 031). CDBG funds in the amount of \$177,594 was spent to complete 4 street improvement projects and \$149,291 was spent on 23 ongoing street improvement projects. One street improvement project was canceled (Matrix Code 03K). \$447,134 of CDBG funds was spent for 8 ongoing sidewalk projects (Matrix Code O3L). Two demolition projects were canceled and \$546 in CDBG funds was spent on 2 demolition projects (Matrix Code O4). \$4,943 in CDBG funds was spent on one project providing non-profit organizational capacity building (Matrix Code 19C).

To increase or improve the Availability and/or Accessibility of Economic
Opportunities for Low Income Persons (EO-1) (CD045509, CD055505,
CD020602, CD035507, CD045507, CD055506, CD065508, CD075504,
CD075507, CD075508) In FY 2007, \$50,000 was spent to complete one
employment training services project (Matrix Code 05H). \$17,105.97 in
CDBG funds was spent on two micro-enterprise assistance projects

which were ongoing (Matrix Code 18C). \$287,274 in CDBG funds was spent to complete four projects of commercial infrastructure for a business park in Big Beaver (Matrix Code 17B). In addition, the design and environmental review for the business park in Midland acquired with CDBG funds was begun during this reporting year. (Matrix Code 01).

To increase Affordability in Economic Opportunities for Low Income Persons (EO-2) (CD075509) \$5,300 in CDBG funds was spent on one revolving loan for one business (Matrix Code 18A).

To Sustain Economic Opportunities for Low Income Persons (EO-3) (CD035503, CD055503, CD045503, CD075503, CD065516, CD065516) \$214,427 in CDBG funds was spent to rehabilitate 13 commercial façades. In addition, \$145,460 in CDBG funds was spent on technical assistance and staff support for ten local revitalization organizations.

To benefit the citizens of Beaver County through planning activities and studies (O-1) (CD052200, CD052201, CD045519, CD045529, CD055504, CD030503, CD040503, CD045526, CD054702, CD035514, CD030202, CD040200, CD040100, CD032500) \$25,082 in CDBG funds was spent to complete four planning activities and studies (Matrix Code 20). \$10,391 in CDBG funds was spent on nine ongoing studies and planning activities (Matrix Code 20).

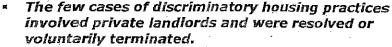
c. Beaver County is making progress toward its goals and in reaching its objectives. However, the Fair Housing objectives, which are based on an analysis from 1991, do not adequately reflect the work currently required of the fair housing officer. To address this discrepancy a new analysis of impediments to fair housing was conducted during the 2007 fiscal year. This analysis is giving appropriate direction to the fair housing officer. The new barriers to fair housing choice and action steps to address these Barriers will be reported in the FY 2008 CAPER.

In addition, Beaver County has <u>123</u> CDBG projects which have not yet been completed because most projects take two years to complete.

- 2. Beaver County plans to adjust its outcomes and objectives for the fair housing program based on an analysis of impediments to fair housing which was completed at the end of the 2007 fiscal year. This will better address Beaver County's current fair housing needs.

- a. The summary of impediments identified in the 1991 Fair Housing Analysis summary of findings and conclusions include:

impediments will be implemented and reported on in FY 2008.

 Unfair or discriminatory housing practices do not appear to be widespread.



- Formal interaction between housing groups and agencies is underdeveloped.
- The substance of the Fair Housing Law and amendments are not widely known.
- Redlining does not appear to be a problem in Beaver County.
- There are significant waiting lists for assisted housing and public housing.
- Municipal zoning ordinances do not define group homes for disabled people and limitations on the number of group homes in any community.
- Lenders are aware of their CRA responsibilities but had few investment opportunities created by the County.
- Supply of handicapped housing appears to be inadequate.
- There is an overwhelming demand for housing rehabilitation grants for lower income homeowners.
- Few affordable housing resources located in proximity to job growth areas.
- Several public housing and private assisted housing facilities are not accessible by public transportation.
- Areas with relatively high minority populations such as Aliquippa, Midland and Beaver Falls tend to have dispropertionately higher minority representation in assisted housing facilities.
- There exists no formal mechanism within County government to receive Fair Housing inquires to provide housing referral/counseling services.
- Many lenders are unfamiliar with the PHFA First Time Homebuyer Mortgage program and Rehb/Purchase Mortgage Insurance Program.

A new analysis was completed at the end of FY 2007 which identified new impediments which will be addressed in FY 2008.

b. While many of the impediments identified in the 1991 Fair Housing Analysis have been addressed since the Analysis was completed, the County continues to take action as outlined in the plan. Refer to the <u>Impediments to Fair Housing Choice</u> tab for a list of recommend actions and accomplishments in FY 2007 to overcome the impediments.

The HACB continued to counsel Section 8 tenants as to the location of units outside of areas of poverty or minority concentration and assist them to locate those units. The HACB also markets the Housing Choice Section 8 program to owners outside of areas of poverty or minority concentrations.

The objective sheets continue to be incorrect in reflecting the performance indicators for the Fair Housing Office listed in Table C -

Proposed Activities to Promote Fair Housing choice FY 2005-FY 2009. The Performance Indicators and Expected Numbers were corrected to reflect the measurable indicators associated with the responsibilities of the Fair Housing Office. A new analysis was completed at the end of FY 2007 which identified new impediments which result in new performance indicators will be reported on in FY 2008.

- 4. All of the activities carried out during the reporting period with CDBG, HOME, ESG, and other funds were implemented for the purpose of meeting underserved needs. These activities are described throughout the CAPER document. The work of the Community Development Program of Beaver County is based on the premise that federal and other leveraged funding resources will finance underserved needs. These needs are identified through the Consolidated Planning process. For example, affordable housing activities carried out by the Community Development Program of Beaver County benefit low and moderate income households. These households are targeted for homeownership opportunities because they are unable to secure funding on their own from local lending institutions. This has been identified as an underserved need and is the primary basis for the Community Development Program of Beaver County's activities.
- 5 a. In addition to CDBG, HOME and ESG funds, Beaver County has been successful in leveraging additional resources to carry out various projects during the reporting period. These resources include:
 - The Capital Fund by the HACB
 - A grant for \$55,598 in Supportive Housing funds to fund the HMIS
 - Beaver County Community Services Block Grant funds of \$365,933 for anti-poverty and self-sufficiency programming
 - A grant for \$161,459 in Pennsylvania Homeless Assistance Program funds for case management services, bridge housing and rental assistance
 - Supportive Work funding in the amount of \$192,832 for a
 welfare reform initiative employment program. An additional
 \$142,709 was added to this contract for equipment and
 software programs for testing and work readiness initiatives
 - Pennsylvania Redevelopment and Housing Assistance funds were obtained in the amount of \$247,045 for flood recovery efforts in the City of Aliquippa
 - b. Local banks participated as limited partners in the Beaver County Homebuyers Program Partnership by making equity contributions as a source of interim financing for acquisition for rehabilitation or resale.

c. The county matched its HOME Program expenditures with \$265,339.17 of PA Act 137 funds, and \$479,311.65 in carryover credit from prior years.

Managing the Process

Program Year 3 CAPER Managing the Process response:

1. The Community Development Program retained the responsibility of administering programs covered by the Consolidated Plan through direct project management and through agreements with subrecipients. CDBG funds were utilized to assist the County in achieving the three national objectives of the program. These objectives are to provide decent housing, create a suitable living environment and expand economic opportunities. Effective program delivery is possible only with the assistance of local agencies and nonprofit organizations that provide insight into the needs of residents. The County continued to utilize the HUD performance measurement system. It has also used additional measurements that the HUD system did not provide so that each of the activities accomplished by the County can be appropriately measured. Subrecipients included Geneva College, Beaver County Corporation for Economic Development, the Corporation for Owner-Operator Projects, The HACB, and Housing Opportunities of Beaver County. In addition, through contact with and monitoring by the HUD Pittsburgh Regional Field Office, the Community Development Program of Beaver County was assisted in ensuring compliance with requirements. Attendance by the Community Development Program staff at trainings and workshops also helped to enable the Community Development Program of Beaver County to better manage the programs and projects that it oversees. Because the nonprofits are vital partners for the delivery of services and programs to County residents, these organizations are an important part of the Community Development Program of Beaver County's delivery network. During the reporting period, the Community Development Program of Beaver County worked closely with these organizations which also work together, seek quidance from each other and from a valuable network of resources for the County. Please refer to Appendix F for the MBE and WBE Performance reports, which include the MBE and WBE businesses that the Community Development Program contracted with this year.

Institutional Structure

1. Describe actions taken during the last year to overcome gaps in institutional structures and enhance coordination.

Program Year 3 CAPER Institutional Structure response:

During the reporting period, the County continued three activities designed to fill gaps that were identified as needing to be addressed in order to meet the expectations of the program.

The County hired a consultant to perform construction management on significant rehabilitation and new construction projects funded all or in part by the HOME Program. The consultant provided any the following services, as requested and/or deemed appropriate by the County:

- Economic feasibility analysis
- Site selections
- Budget estimates
- Overall project administration
- Design phase coordination and review
- Comprehensive scheduling-design and construction
- Constructability reviews

- Contractor bidding/selection
- Construction coordination and inspection
- Cost control
- · Agency liaison to the project

The County contracted with a Housing Specialist/Fair Housing Officer to provide the following services:

- As a Housing Specialist:
 - Serve as the chairperson of the Housing and Homeless Coalition of Beaver County
 - Serve as the liaison to agencies, churches, municipalities, community groups and individuals regarding housing and homeless issues
 - Oversee, in cooperation with the Executive Board of the Housing and Homeless Coalition of Beaver County, the County's continuum of care process, including the submission of funding applications
 - Work with the County Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) to coordinate efforts regarding the HMIS process
 - Perform educational and informational symposiums, as appropriate regarding community awareness of housing issues
 - Work with groups that are interested in developing homeless shelters and homeless support services
 - Identify strengths and weaknesses of the service provision system in addressing homeless and housing issues, working toward advancing communications, streamlining efforts and, advocating for necessary changes and funding solutions
- As Fair Housing Officer
 - Serve as the County's designated Fair Housing Officer
 - Educate and Inform residents, municipalities, housing providers, social service providers, providers of legal services and housing support agencies regarding fair housing regulations
 - Respond to questions and complaints from residents, finding reasonable resolutions to the issues
 - Work to assure compliance with and seek guidance from:
 - HUD Section 504 regulations
 - Pennsylvania Commission on Human Relations
 - National Fair Housing Alliance
 - Federal Fair Housing Act
 - Work with other regional fair housing agencies for the provision of services to residents outside the scope of work expected from the County for this position

In order to take a more active role in the successes of minority-owned business enterprises and/or women-owned business enterprises (MBEs/WBEs), the County has made a commitment to promoting involvement in funded activities and other contract opportunities, and providing educated guidance to parties who are interested in becoming certified MBEs/WBEs.

During the reporting period, the County has accomplished the following:

- Organized and attended a meeting with the Black, Minority, and Women Business Owners Western Region Representative, the Special Assistant to the Secretary for Western Pennsylvania and the director of the Beaver County Minority Coalition
- Hosted a Doing Business with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania seminar in Beaver County
- Maintained and updated a mailing list for known MBEs/WBEs in Beaver County
- Maintained contact with the Beaver County Chamber of Commerce to inform them of our efforts and invited them to join us in helping to get more business owners MBE/WBE certified
- Furnished MBE/WBE Certification Application and guidelines for distribution by Minerity Coalition

Program Year 3 CAPER Monitoring response:

- 1. The Community Development Program of Beaver County (CDP) kept records on its progress toward meeting the consolidated plan goals and on the statutory and regulatory compliance of each activity. For each activity authorized under the National Affordable Housing Act, the CDP used fiscal and management procedures that ensured program compliance, funds accountability and complete and accurate reporting to HUD. These programs are subject to the Single Audit Act. Similar procedures were followed for non-CDBG funded projects. The County was proactive in reassigning program funds as they became available. Beaver County continued to utilize the performance measurement system including the outcomes, indicators and accomplishments developed by HUD to monitor the productivity of its program. Subrecipient agreements were monitored and managed on an engoing basis.
- 2. All subrecipient projects were monitored and found to be in compliance with the requirements. In addition, the Project Managers reported on the progress of each project on a monthly or more frequent basis which resulted in projects being completed more expediently. The Fiscal Coordinator generated monthly financial reports that were reviewed by the Director and assisted in ensuring the timeliness of the expenditure of funds, the reprogramming of funds and the compliance with expenditure caps. In addition, to ensure the timeliness of expenditures, the Community Development Program conducted 6-month budget reviews of expenditures on projects, reviewed monthly IDIS and other financial reports, and examined projections based on active projects. To ensure that accomplishments are reported in a timely fashion, project data was updated in IDIS on a quarterly basis and IDIS data clean-ups were completed.
- 3. a. A substantial part or 84.78% of the program funding went directly to activities benefiting low income persons. These activities work to help to solve neighborhood and community problems through making suitable living environments, decent housing and economic opportunity available, accessible, affordable and sustainable for individuals, households and communities that are of low and moderate income. These projects helped their communities be better places for low and moderate income people in which to live.
- b. The Community Development Program of Beaver County made progress in meeting its highest priority needs and working toward its five year goals. - g. The greatest barrier that had a negative impact on Beaver County meeting its goals was the lack of necessary financial resources. Despite this lack of resources, Beaver County continued its strategy of identifying sites that are physically suitable for the development of affordable housing and, where economically feasible, provided such sites with the necessary public infrastructure. The County also pursued economic development activities that would produce jobs. However, because of the time that it takes to develop business parks, no jobs have been created yet. The County pursued activities that enable low-income residents to obtain affordable housing and continued to provide homeownership and rehabilitation assistance programs that benefit low moderate income households. The County continues to encourage private investment as a match to public investment, so that we may maximize the opportunities provided through the entitlement funds.
- Beaver County's goals continue to be on target for most activities' goal performance. Beaver County has performed greater than expected in a number of areas. For park and recreation improvements [Matrix Code 03F -Objective Sheets SL-3(2) and SL-1(2)], in the last 3 years the County spent \$10,292 less than anticipated and completed 9 more projects than anticipated. Funding for smaller projects was requested over the three years therefore more were able to be completed. For economic development technical assistance [Matrix Codes 19C and 20 and objective sheet EO-3(2)], in three years, the County has spent \$346,040 more than the five-year goal of \$90,000. The growth of the Main Street Center program and its corresponding website development was not anticipated when the five-year plan was written. For acquisition, disposition and clearance activities [Matrix Codes 01, 02 and 04 and objective sheets SL-3(9)], in three years \$107,075 more than the five-year goal of \$250,000 was spent. One unanticipated large acquisition for a business park was completed within this goal. In addition, 35 more structures were demolished than the five-year goal of 20. The requests for demolition exceeded the County's estimate. For acquisition of real property for commercial development [Matrix Code 17A and objective sheet EO-1(3)], acquisition of property for a business park in a low-income area required more CDBG funds than anticipated in the five-year plan.

Beaver County has fallen short of goals in some areas. For sidewalk improvements [Matrix Code 03L and objective sheet SL-3(5)] only \$242,224 of an allocated \$755,000 has been spent. Spending on one project has been delayed because more than one year's funding was required for the project. Three other projects which would have normally been funded with CDBG entitlement money were funded through Section 108 Loan, PennDot and DCED funds. For parking facilities improvements, [Matrix Code 03G and

objective sheet SL-1(1)], \$51,322 or 32% of the anticipated three-year amount of \$162,000 was spent on this goal. Fewer requests were made for this type of project than anticipated. For general or other public facilities improvements, the County spent \$404,173 or 38% of the anticipated three-year amount of \$1,080,000. The County was able to categorize most infrastructure projects under more specific matrix codes. For microenterprise assistance, [Matrix Code 18C and objective sheet EO-1(2)] the County has spent \$77,524 or 56% of the anticipated three-year amount of \$140,000. The agency providing the service did not require as much funding as originally anticipated and the number of requests for the service decreased by more than one-half in 2007. The County did fund an additional microenterprise program in 2008 which should increase both spending and the number of participants. For information on housing goals please refer to 1. under the Specific Housing Objectives in this document.

i. The County would change the goal associated with the Main Street Program [Objective sheet EO-3(2)] to be increased to \$145,000 per year or \$725,000 over five years. The five-year goal to improve parking facilities [Matrix Code 03G and objective sheet SL-1(1)] would be decreased by \$180,000 leaving \$90,000. The five-year goal to improve general or other public facilities improvements would be decreased to one-half the amount or \$900,000. The goals, objectives and outcomes will be adjusted in FY 2008 to reflect the conclusions from the analysis of impediments to fair housing that was conducted in FY 2007.

Lead-based Paint

Program Year 3 CAPER Lead-based Paint response:

1. To continue compliance with federal requirements, the County identified categories of residents to be assisted, housing activities to be undertaken, and the programs and resources in support of those activities. As a result of Beaver County's training efforts, at least four contractors are certified as supervisors. Training continued on an as needed basis. The County secured the services of a certified firm to perform risk assessment, inspections and clearance testing on applicable properties. During the reporting period, 100 units were tested for lead-based paint before work began, with 23 of those units testing positive for lead-based paint. A certified contractor removed the lead-based paint before rehabilitation work began in the affected units.

 Describe Actions taken during the last year to foster and maintain affordable housing.

Program Year 3 CAPER Housing Needs response:

Beaver County continued its successful housing rehabilitation initiatives. By offering opportunities for rehabilitation of older housing units owned or rented by low income households, the County was able to assist in the maintenance of affordable housing units and the preservation of neighborhoods. It is an important effort given the limited development of affordable housing units. Rehabilitation also assisted the elderly and disabled in making their homes adaptable to their special needs.

A total of 144 affordable housing units were rehabilitated or created through the County's CDBG and HOME and ACT 137 programs during the reporting period including 35 owner-occupied units rehabilitated through the Home Improvement Program, 25 owner occupied units weatherized, 10 renter occupied units weatherized, 69 owner-occupied units received emergency repairs, 15 households received homebuyer assistance to purchase their own homes. Eleven affordable rental housing units were constructed.

Beaver County continued to solicit proposals from qualified CHDOs and from private developers to develop new rental housing opportunities for low income households. During the reporting period one CHDO application was submitted to the County from Changing the World. This was approved and they are in the process of applying for funds.

Program Year 3 CAPER Specific Housing Objectives response:

- The total breakdown by household income is described in the Housing Needs Tables of this document. The breakdown for each program by household income is contained in the decent housing objective sheets included in this document under the Objectives tab. The number of extremely low (< 30% MFI), very low (30% to 50% MFI) and low (50% to 80% MFI) income households served by the first-time homebuyer program significantly decreased from 24 to 16. The mortgage forclosure crisis resulted in the ability to obtain fewer mortgages for these households that are a higher lending risk. Bank activity in the area of higher risk mortgage lending stalled, the credit score requirement increased significantly, and banks no longer offered 100% financed mortgages. With regard to privately-owned safe and affordable housing [Objective sheet DH-2(2a], Beaver County has consistently exceeded its goal by 591 units or 46%, In addition, the tenant based rental assistance offered through HOME funds [Objective Sheet DH-3(5)] served 42 people, 23 more people than the anticipated number of 19.
- 2. The County created a total of 963 Section 215 rental housing opportunities which is 210 less than the goal of 1173. Of all the rental opportunities, 26 (74 fewer than the goal of 100) were created through the CDBG, HOME, ADDI and Act 137 funded programs. 416 were created through public housing rehabilitation and 525 were created through the Housing Choice Voucher Program. The County created a total of 134 Section 215 owner housing opportunities which is 32 more than the goal of 101. All of the owner housing opportunities were created through the CDBG, HOME, ADDI and Act 137 funded programs.
- 3. The "worst-case" housing needs continue to be housing for young adult males and females (Ages 18-25) with co-occurring disorders, such as drug and alcohol with mental health issues. These are typically "hard to place" individuals who have failed in other programs and who have "burned bridges" with public housing and other affordable housing programs. Beaver County's Continuum of Care has supported the application of Supportive Services, Inc. through the 2007 Supportive Housing Program to provide tenant-based rental assistance which would assist this population. Unfortunately this project was not funded. In FY 2007, Beaver County's Continuum of Care submitted an application and received funding for Supportive Housing funds for renewal of a project to assist 8 persons with "worst-case" housing needs.

Beaver County administered the Homeless Assistance Program funded through the Pennsylvania Department of Public Welfare. Through this program \$161,459 was spent to assist 1526 homeless and near-homeless persons with emergency shelter, transitional housing, rental assistance, utility arrearage assistance and other supportive services. In addition 446 persons were assisted through the Emergency Shelter Grant program where \$176,674 in ESG funds were used to fund supportive services, operations for shelters, homeless prevention, and financial assistance to avoid homelessness.

Program Year 3 CAPER Public Housing Strategy response:

1. The HACB completed renovations on 393 units. To facilitate the identification of necessary renovation work at its public housing communities, the HACB worked closely with its tenant councils. Tenant councils met on a regular basis at each complex. One additional tenant council was created. Tenant council representatives were invited to attend Resident Advisory Board meetings at the Housing Authority's main office to provide input on issues related to public housing.

Program Year 3 CAPER HOME/ADDI response:

1.a. Mayfield Terrace was completed with a total of \$400,710 in HOME 2002, 2003, 2004 and 2005 funds, \$900 of which was spent in FY 2007. Mayfield Terrace provides 4 newly constructed affordable housing units, 3 of which are occupied by very low income households (< 30% MFI) and one that is occupied by a low income household (30% to 50% MFI). Stone Edge

Apartments was completed with a total of \$400,000 in HOME 2005 funding, \$49,687 of which was spent in FY 2007. Stone Edge provides 11 newly constructed affordable housing units, 7 of which are occupied by very low income households (< 30% MFI) and 4 that are occupied by low income households (30% to 50% MFI). In FY 2007, \$42,393 was utilized to assist 42 households with tenant-based rental assistance. No ADDI funds were spent in FY 2007.

- In accordance with Beaver County's commitment to nondiscrimination and equal opportunity in housing, the County has established procedures to affirmatively market housing units rehabilitated or assisted under the HOME Investment Partnerships Program. These procedures are intended to further the objectives of Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968 and Executive Order 11063. Beaver County believes that individuals of similar economic levels in the same housing market area should have a similar range of housing choices available to them regardless of their race, color, religion, sex, familial status, handicap, or national origin. Individuals eligible for public housing assistance or individuals who have minor children should also have a similar range of housing choices available to them. Beaver County implemented this policy through affirmative marketing procedures designed for the HOME Investment Partnerships Program. All participants in the HOME program must agree in writing to abide by the County's Affirmative Marketing Policy. The Affirmative Marketing Policy becomes part of the loan agreement that is signed by the owner of a rental project. CHDOs or other subrecipients' agreements specify the Affirmative Marketing Procedures that must be followed. Under the ADDI program, Housing Opportunities, the organization that conducts the Homebuyer program, and the HACB distributed brochures describing the program to residents, tenants, and families that were potentially eligible. Brochures were also given to lending institutions for distribution. Housing Opportunities also provided a housing counselor who regularly met with public housing tenants and their families at the community centers located within each public housing area. The counselor provided information on the program, assisted with credit reviews, counseled the tenants on improving credit records, and prepared the tenant to purchase a home. These

counseling services were also provided to persons participating in the Homebuyer program who were not living in public housing.

c. Beaver County continues to work with WBE and MBE developers, consultants and contractors in the HOME program whenever possible. Beaver County's HOME and ADDI minority outreach efforts are included under the MBE WBE Reports CDBG and HOME tab of this document.

Program Year 3 CAPER Homeless Needs response:

1. Beaver County continues to support efforts to address homeless issues by providing assistance to human service agencies through the Emergency Shelter Grant Program, the PA Homeless Assistance Program, and the PA Act 137 Housing Trust Fund. Homeless issues are addressed on a case-by-case basis to serve needs specific to the individual or family.

The County funds a homeless helpline that operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The hotline offers referrals specific to the individual caller's needs.

The County employs a database system of tracking housing requests for homeless and near homeless individuals. The HMIS was instituted to better track homeless. In FY 2007, 320 people were assisted through the HMIS program.

2. In 2007, Friendship Homes continued a permanent housing program for homeless individuals, provided on a countywide, scattered site basis. The program, managed by the local Salvation Army, operates nine units with a total of 23 beds. The individuals who participate in this program are admitted with an emergency homeless need. Participants work with a case manager to identify issues that are keeping them from obtaining self-sufficiency. While in the program, the individual receives services in the identified areas of need, such as employment training, family relationships, daily living skills, budgeting, drug and alcohol counseling and/or mental health services. Although Friendship Homes is structured as a permanent housing program, the ultimate goal of the program is to assist the individuals to reach their goal of achieving independence as a private renter or homeowner. In addition, the Housing Specialist attended training from

National City Bank regarding its Family Savings Accounts program, which provides extensive financial planning to low income families who participate in its program.

The County also continued to support permanent housing for homeless through programs operated by Supportive Services and Harbor Point Housing.

The County Housing Specialist worked closely with the State Hospital Oversight Panel of Beaver County Behavioral Health to successfully transition residents of Mayview State Hospital to permanent supportive housing. The hospital will be closed in December, 2008.

- 3. Beaver County was awarded \$55,598 through the 2005 Homeless SuperNOFA to establish the formal HMIS system. The system "went live" in FY 2006 and is the current countywide database. Unfortunately, because of the confidentiality regulations the system is unable to share "real time" information and will not eliminate the duplication of counts of some homeless. The system does provide valuable information regarding vacancies and available services. The system also allows the County to generate reports that will assist in determining successes and identifying service or program needs. In FY 2007, a total of \$865,256 was awarded through the Homeless SuperNOFA to continue the following programs:
 - HACB awarded \$55,597 for HMIS to continue the formal HMIS system
 - Harbor Point Housing awarded \$79,758 for the Freedom
 Project which provides housing and supportive services to
 individuals with mental health disabilities and families with
 a member who has a mental health disability
 - Supportive Services, Inc. awarded \$175,561 for Melrose Place which provides housing and supportive services for elderly persons with mental health disabilities
 - Supportive Services, Inc. awarded \$389,910 for Stone
 Harbour which provides housing and supportive services for
 people with a mental health and a drug or alcohol diagnosis
 being released from jail
 - Supportive Services, Inc. awarded \$164,430 for its Young Consumers program which provides housing and supportive services to people age 18-25 with mental health disabilities

Specific Homeless Prevention Elements

Program Year 3 CAPER Specific Housing Prevention Elements response:

1. The County has made great efforts in the area of homeless prevention. The Homeless Helpline is currently managed by CONTACT Beaver Valley and is a 24 hour a day, seven day a week telephone helpline

that is staffed to receive calls and make appropriate housing referrals through the use of the County's Homeless Resource Directory. The homeless resource directory was uploaded to a countywide database that is being used by social service agencies that assist the homeless. Twice a year the County updates and distributes a laminated emergency resource card with current contacts for housing, food, crisis and behavioral health needs.

The HMIS system continued to work with housing and service providers. The participating providers received training throughout the year to correct data quality issues.

The County continued to provide funding through state Homeless Assistance Program sources for homeless prevention through a rental assistance program. This program also provided assistance for utility and mortgage payment arrearages and down payment and security deposit costs.

The County Office of Veterans Affairs continued to provide support, including collaboration with the Pittsburgh area Vietnam Veterans Leadership Program that provides resources to veterans relating to homeless issues.

A point in time survey was completed on January 30, 2008.

The Housing and Homeless Coalition has expanded its membership to include representation from adjacent counties, Allegheny, Lawrence and Butler, in order to share information and resources as well as identify gaps in services. Representatives from Southwestern PA Legal Services, Allegheny Department of Health and Human Services and Southwestern PA Aids Planning Coalition attend monthly meetings of the Coalition.

Program Year 3 CAPER ESG response:

- 1. During the reporting period, Beaver County used its annual Emergency Shelter Grants (ESG) fund allocation to help address various homeless issues in the County. The County budgeted ESG funds for homeless facility operating costs and supportive services. There were no specific plans to open any new emergency shelters. The County's focus was the implementation of strategies to assist homeless individuals and families through the provision of transitional housing opportunities. To achieve this objective, the County expended its ESG funds as follows:
 - Beaver County Community Housing Development Organization, Inc. (BCCHDO) - BCCHDO was granted \$35,000 (ESG 06) which was completely expended by the end of the reporting period. BCCHDO was granted \$35,000 (ESG 07) on April 24, 2008 and expended \$2,780 by the end of the reporting period.
 - Supportive Services, Inc. Supportive Services was granted \$65,344
 (ESG 06) and expended the entire amount. Supportive Services was
 granted \$50,080 (ESG 07) on April 24, 2008 and expended \$9,671
 during the reporting period.
 - The Salvation Army was awarded \$11,629 (ESG 06) for operating. All funds were expended in FY 2007. On June 28, 2007 the Salvation Army was awarded \$25,545 (ESG 06) for a matching grant for their Supportive Housing project. \$16,252 was expended in FY 2007. The Salvation was also awarded a grant of \$11,629 (ESG 07) on June 28, 2008 for supportive services which was unexpended in FY 2007. In addition, the Salvation Army was awarded \$19,113 (ESG 07) for a matching grant for their Supportive Housing project.
 - The Women's Center was awarded \$24,000 (ESG 06) for operation. These funds were completely expended in FY 2007. The Women's Center was awarded \$46,488 (ESG 07) of which \$2,410 was expended in FY 2007.
 - ESG 06 funds in the amount of \$5,107 were used for administration.
 No ESG 07 funds were used for administration.

Beaver County continued to invest its ESG entitlement in a timely manner. To ensure timeliness expenditure of funds, these projects are monitored monthly by the project manager. In addition, the ESG application process is completed and contracts awarded within 10 months of the award to the County so that funds can be expended prior to the deadline. The projects are proceeding in a reasonable manner and it is expected that all funds will be expended with the 24 month period.

The very limited funding resources received by the County were distributed to several local nonprofit organizations that have demonstrated excellent administrative capacity. In addition to providing assistance to homeless families and individuals through these organizations, the County also establishes a priority for assisting those who are at risk of becoming homeless. These families and individuals are typically provided financial assistance to pay for rent and utilities in order to remain in their current homes. Preventing homelessness in these situations can often require fewer financial resources in the long-term.

2. a. These activities address the objective of making decent housing accessible and/or affordable to low moderate income persons. Through non-profit organizations and other public agencies, Beaver County spent \$178,716 in ESG funds to provide assistance to the homeless population and those at risk of becoming homeless. 802 homeless persons were provided case management. This number increased from 330 in FY 2006 due to better reporting and increased need. Refer to Outcome Sheets for further information.

To ensure that all ESG funds are expended within the 24-month period required by Federal regulation, all projects are monitored monthly by the project manager; and agencies are required to submit monthly invoices. In addition, the ESG application process is completed and contracts awarded within 10 months of the award to the County so that funds can be expended prior to the deadline.

- b. 396 people in 171 extremely low income households were provided emergency shelter and 219 people with extremely low income (<30% MFI) were provided transitional housing. These numbers were greater than anticipated due to better reporting and increased need.
- 3. A total of \$162,143 in ESG program expenditures was matched with a total of \$1,301,507 in other grant funds, fundraising and donated goods. The following matching funds or in-kind services were secured for the ESG program expenditures during the reporting period. No volunteer service hours were used as match during the reporting period.
 - The total ESG expenditures by Beaver County Community Housing Development Organization, Inc. (BCCHDO) during the reporting period were \$37,788. No matching funds were made by BCCHDO.
 - The total ESG expenditures by Supportive Services Inc. during the reporting period were \$70,424. This amount was matched with

\$783,888 in funding from the local MH/MR office and donations of bakery goods worth approximately \$104,000 from a local grocery store chain.

- The total ESG expenditures by the Salvation Army were \$27,521. This
 amount was matched with \$10,000 in operating funds provided by
 the Beaver Falls Office of the Salvation Army.
- The total ESG expenditures by the Women's Center of Beaver County during the reporting period were \$26,410. This amount was matched with \$290,552 in Pennsylvania Coalition Against Domestic Violence funds, \$42,552 in United Way funds, \$58,004 in funds from Beaver County Children and Youth Services, and \$12,511 from Beaver County District Attorney outreach funds.

In addition, a total of \$161,459 in HAP funds was received in FY 2006 of which \$11,500 was used by the Beaver County Community Development Program for Administration of the program. The remaining funds were distributed as follows:

- Voluntary Action Center received \$38,909 to provide rental and utility assistance to persons at risk for homelessness.
- BCCHDO received \$24,000 for operation of a transitional shelter.
- Contact Beaver Valley received \$7,000 to run the Homeless Helpline.
- The Women's Center of Beaver County received \$22,000 to provide case management services.
- Harbor Point Housing received \$39,000 to provide case management services.
- The Women's Center of Beaver County received \$14,000 for the Bridge Housing Program which provides transitional housing services.
- The Salvation Army received \$3,000 to provide emergency housing services.

Through the Weatherization program, energy efficiency improvements were made to:

Through the Home Improvement Program repairs were made to:

- Six elderly, 7 small and 1 large owner households with incomes less than 30% of Median Family Income
- Two elderly, 5 small and 1 large owner households with incomes between 30% and 50% of the Median Family Income
- Five elderly, 6 small and 2 large owner households with incomes between 50% and 80% of the Median Family Income.

The repairs to these homes allowed decent affordable housing to be sustained for these families.

It was granted \$3,982,676 in CDBG funds, \$803,442 in HOME funds, \$13,545 in ADDI funds, and \$170,730 in ESG funds. Beaver County received \$395,570 in Supportive Housing Program funding. The following funds were applied for and/or received from the state of Pennsylvania:
 - PA Department of Public Welfare Homeless Assistance Program funds in the amount of \$161,459
 - Elm Street Program funds in the amount of \$50,000
 - Supported Work Program funds in the amount of \$192,832
 - Community Services Block Grant Program in the amount of \$335,541

Local funding consisted of \$206,000 in Act 137 Affordable Housing funds.

b. The County issues Certifications of Consistency with the Consolidated Plan for HUD programs in a fair and impartial manner. The projects are reviewed in relationship to the goals and objectives of the Consolidated Plan. In addition, the County provides certifications to those entities submitting applications to HUD so that applications can be submitted in a timely manner. During the reporting period, the County certified the consistency of the Annual Agency Plan of the HACB for Fiscal Year 2008. In addition, the County certified the consistency of the Supportive Housing

Program Application which included the Stone Harbour, The Freedom Project, Melrose Place, Young Consumers and Friendship Homes programs as well as the HACB'S TBRA and HMIS programs. The County certified the consistency of the West Penn Rural Fair Housing Initiative project, the Reliable Housing project, Connelly Park Housing and the Passavant Memorial Homes Section 811 project. The County also wrote a letter of support for the Southwestern Pennsylvania Legal Service, Inc. and Neighborhood Legal Services Association.

- c. The County continued its implementation of the Consolidated Plan. The activities implemented were a part of the Consolidated Plan and were determined through the Citizen Participation process as well as through the application process. Beaver County did not hinder Consolidated Plan implementation by action or willful inaction.
- 4. a. All funds were used to meet national objectives.
- b. During the reporting period, the expenditures complied with overall benefit certification.
- 5. a. b. and c. No activities undertaken during the reporting period resulted in resident displacement.
- a. b. and c. During this reporting period, a total of \$692,510 in CDBG funds was spent on economic development activities. One low/mod job for the owner of one business was created through two loans totaling \$5300 through the revolving loan program (Activity 1501). As a requirement of the program, qualified applicants are low-income persons who are starting or expanding their microenterprises. \$287,274 was spent to complete four projects of commercial infrastructure for the Westgate business park in Big Beaver (Activity Nos. 1166, 1195, 1267 and 1340). The Westgate business park infrastructure projects addressed a slum and blight National Objective therefore it is not necessary to report the number of jobs created. The design and environmental review for the Midland KOZ business park (Activity Nos. 1266 and 1339) were begun in this reporting year and it is anticipated that jobs will be created in 2013 when the business park is completed. \$17,105 was spent to provide technical assistance to 40 low income people who own or are starting microenterprises (Activity Nos. 1445 and 1449).

Of the \$382,829 reported in IDIS that was spent on commercial façade rehabilitation (Matrix Code 14E), \$214,427 was utilized to assist 13 businesses rehab the facades of their buildings (Activity No. 1401). \$116,348 in draws taken in previous years were revised and put in activities that reflected an LMA National Objective. Prior to this the County listed every façade project under a Slum and Blight National Objective. The total actually spent on economic development activities in FY 2007 was \$576,162 which was \$160,599 or 27.9% more than in FY 2006. This increase can be accounted for because of the large expenditures made to complete the Westgate business park infrastructure project during the reporting year.

Aliquippa Neighborhood Revitalization Strategy:

Housing

The City of Aliquippa will seek to have additional owner-occupied homes rehabilitated through beaver County's Home Improvement Program. During the reporting period 8 homes were rehabilitated in the City of Aliquippa through the Home Improvement Program.

The City of Aliquippa will pursue its goal of Increased homeownership via the Housing Authority of Beaver County Homeownership Program. Beaver County Act 137 funds will be used in conjunction with Housing Authority funds, Federal Home Loan Band funds and equity from a limited partnership to stimulate homeownership in Aliquippa. These programs expect to assist households in Beaver County in FY 2007 via pre-purchase and post-purchase counseling, down payment/closing cost assistance and appraisal

gap subsidies. Residents of Aliquippa are referred to the First Time Homebuyer Program.

The County's Consolidated Plan was amended to contain 50,000 for spot demolition/clearance of 17 structures throughout the city. Removal of vacant dilapidated structures will eliminate blighting influences and potential safety hazards, thereby improving the quality of life for area residents. \$1,750 was spent this year to complete the clearance of 5 buildings.

Economic Development

The Consolidated Plan contains \$135,000 for Main Street Planning to assist ten county business districts. The Aliquippa Franklin Avenue Development Committee participates in Beaver County's Main Street Network in revitalizing the City's Central Business District (CBD) and make it a more economically viable business district. In FY 2007, Aliquippa participated in the County's Main Street Network program.

The Consolidated Plan contains \$350,000 for façade improvements in 10 county business districts. The Aliquippa Franklin Avenue Development Committee participates in Beaver County's Façade Improvement Program. In FY 2007, 1 Façade renovation project was completed in Aliquippa. The Franklin Avenue Development Committee also participated in Beaver County's Architectural Conceptual Design Program.

Infrastructure

The Consolidated Plan Includes \$50,000 for improvement of one street in the City of Aliquippa. In FY 2007, three street improvement projects were completed and one was underway in the City of Aliquippa. A total of \$358 in CDBG funds was spent on road improvement projects. \$2,790 was spent on street culvert repair. \$11,120 was spent on development or improvement of neighborhood facilities.

Supportive Services

The County's Consolidated Plan includes \$170,730 to support non-profit organizations that provide emergency housing to homeless individuals and families, help prevent homelessness and eviction, provide transitional housing or create permanent housing. These organizations include the Women's Center, Supportive Services and Beaver County Community Housing Development Organization, Inc. Clients of these non-profit agencies include the city of Aliquippa residents. In FY 2007, \$167,250 in ESG funds was spent on these activities.

Beaver Falls Neighborhood Revitalization Strategy

Housing

Based on past participation levels, the City of Beaver Falls can expect to have additional owner-occupied homes rehabilitated through Beaver

County's Home Improvement Program. During the reporting period, 6 homes were rehabilitated through the Home Improvement Program.

The City of Beaver Falls will pursue its goal of increased homeownership via the Beaver County Housing Authority's Homeownership Program. Beaver County Act 137 funds will be used in conjunction with Housing Authority funds, Federal Home Loan Band funds and equity from a limited partnership to stimulate homeownership in Beaver Falls. These programs expect to assist households in Beaver County in FY 2007 via pre-purchase and post-purchase counseling, down payment/closing cost assistance and appraisal gap subsidies. In FY 2007, residents of Beaver Falls are referred to the First Time Homebuyer Program.

Economic Development

The Consolidated Plan contains \$148,000 for Main Street Planning to assist ten county business districts. The Beaver Falls Business District Authority participates in Beaver County's Main Street Network in revitalizing the City's Central Business District (CBD) and make it a more economically viable business district. In FY 2007, Beaver Falls received services through the County's Main Street Network program.

The Consolidated Plan contains \$350,000 for façade improvements in ten county business districts. The Beaver Falls Business District Authority participates in Beaver County's Façade Improvement Program. In FY 2005, 2 façade renovation projects were completed in Beaver Falls. The Beaver Falls Business District Authority also participates in Beaver County's Architectural Conceptual Design Program.

Infrastructure

The Consolidated Plan includes \$75,000 for street improvements in the City of Beaver Falls. A portion of this will be used to repave 3 streets in the city's target Housing Improvement Area. These improvements will address poor street conditions in this area, improve the quality of life for area residents, and support housing development in the target area. In FY 2007, 6 street improvement projects were completed and 3 were underway in the City of Beaver Falls. A total of \$4,686 in CDBG funds was spent on these projects.

Supportive Services

The County's Consolidated Plan includes \$170,730 to support non-profit organizations that provide emergency housing to homeless individuals and families, help prevent homelessness and eviction, provide transitional housing or create permanent housing. These organizations include the Women's Center, Supportive Services and Beaver County Community Housing Development Organization, Inc. Many of the clients of these non-profit agencies live in the Beaver Falls area. In FY 2007, \$167,250 in ESG funds was spent on these activities.

Antipoverty Strategy

1. Describe actions taken during the last year to reduce the number of persons living below the poverty level.

Program Year 3 CAPER Antipoverty Strategy response:

1. Beaver County, through the Community Services Program, is committed to supporting projects that have an impact on the causes of poverty in our communities and to work toward a holistic approach at combining efforts to promote and facilitate self-sufficiency.

The County has utilized \$365,933 of the Community Services Block Grant to fund 6 services under a subcontract with 12 providers and to conduct administration of the program. The projects and/or services meet locally determined needs relevant to low income individuals/families and vulnerable population groups such as children, individuals with developmental disabilities, elderly, and persons with mental illness.

A list of the services for which funding was provided and the targeted populations that were served is as follows:

Self-Sufficiency

Beaver County Head Start (\$29,451 serving 171 individuals) This project engages a minimum of 30 "high risk" families in Beaver County in a process of problem solving using a "mentoring" model of intensive case management including counseling and development of an individual Family Service Plan. The "mentor"/social worker will remain involved with each family 3 months on average or longer as needed, identifying short and long term objectives with the families and educate them about community resources, advocating for themselves, and developing problem solving skills to meet future problems with strengthened personal skills.

Education

Beaver County Head Start (\$14,0538 serving 1124 individuals)
"Project Start" provides drug, alcohol and violence abuse lessons, in a classroom setting, to low income children and their parents or guardians.

Emergency Services

The Women's Center of Beaver County (\$23,083 serving 129 individuals) "Sexual Assault/Domestic Violence Outreach Prevention Education" program provides education services to individuals from the community that are low income and/or a high risk for abuse and to current victims of abuse who have sought the center for help.

Contact Beaver Valley (\$24,186 serving 7,904 individuals) provides a telephone helpline, crisis intervention service and reassurance program staffed by trained volunteers who respond confidentially to human need 24 hours per day.

Employment

Beaver County Rehabilitation Center, Inc. (\$33,543 serving 30 individuals) provides employment training from initial assessment to competitive placement to low income individuals with disabilities. The program also provides training for individuals to upgrade their current employment status.

Income Management

The Alliance for Consumer Protection (\$17,993 serving 329 individuals) provides consumer services to the client group including consumer credit counseling, budgeting and money management strategies, payment plans for debts, consumer education on making contracts, complaint-mediation, and consumer education about securing credit and loans.

Linkages

Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Beaver County (\$19,420 serving 219 individuals) provides services, transportation to training programs, education field trips and one-to-one mentors to disadvantaged youth who are not currently being served through the traditional Big Brothers / Big Sisters Program. The program also provides training and supervision to adult volunteers who will serve as mentors to the children.

Voluntary Action Center of Beaver County (\$54,877 serving 1430 individuals) provides for basic human needs to low-income/working poor in Beaver County. Provision is made for medical equipment, clothing, furniture, appliances, Christmas gifts, rent/utility assistance and referral to other support agencies.

Neighborhood Legal Services Association (\$26,757 serving 203 individuals) provides service to high priority cases and to individual's participation in consumer clinics. The consumer clinic provides a means of training clients to assist them in resolving consumer problems such as debt collection and harassment. Free legal representation is made available for those whose problems progress to court proceedings.

Homemaker Home Health Services of Beaver County, Inc. (\$34,712 serving 28 individuals) Caregiver Relief Program provides a weekly respite to caregivers of low income residents with disabilities. The respite service is offered to the caregivers, free of charge, to provide time away from their responsibilities.

Aliquippa Alliance for Unity and Development (\$21,655 serving 1351 individuals) Outreach and Referral Service provides assistance to low income individuals in accessing information regarding energy assistance, community based workshops, job listings in cooperation with the Beaver County Job Center, and other social services programs.

Housing

Habitat for Humanity (\$22,455 serving 33 individuals) is a non-profit, self-help housing program that enables low-income persons to obtain housing. The program is designed to assist eligible persons to become self-sufficient through skills development and home ownership. Partner families are required to donate 500 (250 hours if single adult head of household) hours of "sweat equity" in their home and in other partner families' homes.

The Community Services Program of Beaver County also administers additional programs as follows:

<u>Supported Work Program</u> through a subcontract arrangement with the Beaver County Rehabilitation Center. The project has been very successful to date in assisting in the attainment of competitive employment for 90% of its referrals.

<u>Homeless Assistance Program</u> through subcontracts that are made with local social services.

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Non-homeless Special Needs

Program Year 3 CAPER Non-homeless Special Needs response:

1. The Beaver County Community Development Program provided Pennsylvania Accessible Housing grant funding to assist in the rehabilitation of 15 housing units which benefited persons with disabilities during the reporting period.

The HACB continued to implement its Section 504 Assessment recommendations. With an overall goal of making 5% of the public housing stock accessible to persons with disabilities, the Housing Authority received approval for its Section 504 plan from HUD in March 2005. Construction or renovation of 26 units was completed in FY 2007 to meet Uniform Federal Accessibility Standards (UFAS). In addition, the HACB provided supportive services through 3 caseworkers who assisted 125 primarily elderly residents with disabilities to remain in their residences. This number was previously reported to be 1680 which reflects the number of meetings the caseworkers had with the residents and not the number of residents served.

Lutheran Village, a Section 202 funded project which will provide 35 affordable housing units for the elderly in Chippewa was 35% complete at the end of FY 2007. Passavant Homes, through a Section 811 funded

project provided 3 additional units for people with disabilities in Aliquippa. In addition, HUD refinancing funds were provided to the Providence Care Center in Beaver Falls which provides 30 units of assisted living for elderly persons with disabilities.

The County continued providing CDBG assistance to the OVR New Hire Program. This program provides funding for administration of job training and placement services to persons with disabilities. During the reporting period, 14 disabled adults were placed in jobs.

A total of \$47,041 was spent on 14 public facility improvements for handicapped accessibility. One project was canceled and 13 were underway in FY 2007.

Three low income homeowners with disabilities were assisted through the County's Weatherization Program.
